The incubation shed has been erected in the CBNEG grounds beside the Community Hall, with the concrete floor being completed as well.


Thanks to Con for his timely and patient work.





Watch out for Caltrop!

You might have wondered why there have been signs up saying 'Do not drive on the reserve'. Well it's all about a horrible weed called Caltrop (*Tribulus terrestris*) whose spiked seed case can injure feet and puncture tyres.

Caltrop germinates in summer and needs the lightest of rain to germinate. Once again it has been a summer weed problem/priority around the Clayton Bay foreshore trail because of its ability to spread via nasty little sharp prickles as well as thriving in hot summer weather. This is the main reason why driving on the foreshore reserve is discouraged.

Volunteers and walkers have pulled out a huge amount this summer. It is quite likely to be in many backyards and properties in the district. We have it nearly controlled on the foreshore and hope to keep on with control. We encourage members of the community to control it in their properties.

Check your tyres and shoes, especially rubber things for seeds and bin the seeds. They are nasty and easily spread.

The modern name "*caltrop*" is derived from the Latin calcitrata (foot-trap), such as in the French usage chausse-trape. The synonymous Latin word tribulus provides part of the modern Latin name of a plant commonly called the **caltrop**, *Tribulus terrestris*, <https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Caltrop>



One ingenious way of removing the prickles is to get old thongs and walk around in the patches. When the soles are full of prickles, throw the thongs away.

Foreshore Planting 2019

CBNEG were successful with a National Landcare Grant to grow and plant 10,000 plants around the foreshore trail at Clayton Bay.

Alexandrina Council, as the landholder, has approved the proposed planting which continues to follow the Clayton Bay Foreshore Management Plan.

The majority of the plants will be groundcovers to continue with the weed suppression strategy as well as to not interfere with residents views of the waters.

Planting is scheduled for June/July/August, and will be done by community groups. (See Expressions of Interest)

Expressions of Interest – community groups

CBNEG are offering community groups an opportunity for fundraising.

We are asking groups to undertake planting (generally 1000 plants / group), with payment of \$1 per plant including guarding.

You can make the planting day a group effort as there are lots of jobs to do on the day(s) and even beforehand. Some groups have chosen to assemble the guards & stakes beforehand, saving a lot of time and energy on the planting days.

CLAYTON BAY IS WINNING THE WAR (against Caltrop)

Five year old Clayton Bay local, Nash Timmermans, has been spending time this summer pulling out Caltrop from around the Foreshore Trail at Clayton Bay.

Together with other volunteers, Nash is doing his best to ensure that the town is Caltrop free. He has become somewhat of an expert on the weed, and has alerted landholders/householders elsewhere when he has noticed it on their properties, and been able to educate them on control and avoiding further spread.

“Caltrop is bad because it drops lots of seeds that are spikey and it’s really nasty. Its gets bigger and bigger every single day and most days it does get big,” said Nash.

Here are his tips on winning the war:

Pull it out

Bag it up

Compost (hot) or bin it

Remove the seeds from the site if possible.

Summer is a wonderful time of year

But we have missed out on summer rains. Even as we look toward autumn you can't help but notice how dry our land is. With a continuing hot weather forecast it is important to keep your properties clear and remove long grasses, deadwood and other combustible matter from around your property. Be mindful of the best time to slash or mow around your property and be careful of sparks created by machinery. Grass fires travel very quickly and dry windy conditions result in unpredictable fire behaviour.

So far this fire season, Clayton CFS has been involved in containing and extinguishing a grass fire at Finnis and also a grass fire at Milang where along with many other brigades and air support a fire heading toward the lake side shacks was contained. In February, our brigade also attended a grass fire at Mount Compass. Apart from attending fires, on days of extreme weather or Total Fire ban in Mount Lofty and Murraylands regions, Clayton Brigade is also required to have a crew on standby and ready to respond if needed.

This summer Clayton brigade has welcomed three new members to our team. Like all volunteer

organisations, Clayton CFS is dependent on local community members to give some of their time to help make our community a safer place to live in.

Volunteering is very rewarding and you get to enjoy the support from the rest of your community for your efforts. It's not too late if you have been thinking about joining. 

Birds in our area

For this edition I thought I would make a note of birds regularly spotted while going for a walk along the walking trail. I started taking notice two months ago and realised there is not the usual variety and number of birds about this year, and two months later there are even less.

Where have all the water birds gone?

You will see a few Purple Swamp Hens scurrying back to the reeds when disturbed and maybe a lone Black or Pied Cormorant diving for a feed or roosting on a jetty or dead tree. I did spot the tall, sleek, grey White-faced Heron at the water's edge one morning, and the white Great Egret on another occasion. There is usually a lone Whiskered Tern with the grey tummy hawkling above the reeds. You may also see the bigger Crested Tern on the wing overhead.

I have noticed some larger groups of pelicans flying overhead in V formation and there is usually a few roosting at "Duck's Hospital".

Early morning walkers may disturb groups of ground feeding birds like Red-rumped Parrots and Crested Pigeons.

But, from my observations, there is an absence of coots, ducks and grebes and birds of prey like Swamp Harriers, Whistling Kites, Kestrels and Black-shouldered Kites make a rare appearance.

Surprises are worth the wait...

I had a lovely surprise early this morning, Thursday Jan 24th, when four small yellow Elegant Parrots flittered away while I was walking around The Point/Boating Destination area. They are usually spotted from now until April/May.

The best is usually kept until last. Further along on my walk I was thrilled to see two Latham's Snipe on the shore of the swimming area near the picnic shelter. They are migratory waders that nest in Japan and are in Australia from late September until April.

They are very elusive birds usually spotted at dawn or dusk as they stay in dense cover during the day. The Milang Snipe Sanctuary was established to ensure wetlands habitat is retained for these migratory summer visitors. 'Mozzie' Jan 2019

Recycling in Alexandrina

Sometimes it seems a bit confusing about what can and cannot go into the recycling bin. And to make matters worse it varies from council to council, and as recycling depots are upgraded rules change too.

So here are a few tips which come from the Alexandrina website to help you recycle right:

- **hard plastic** – rigid items LIKE **berry containers, cream, yoghurt, margarine containers (clean) and lids**, and even **inside of biscuit packs** -go in the **RECYCLE BIN** (yellow lid)
- **soft plastic** – plastic which scrunches up easily in your hand – LIKE **cling film, shopping bags, outside of biscuit packs, dog biscuit packs, rice packets, net fruit bags** – go in the **GENERAL WASTE BIN** (blue lid)
- **pizza boxes** – clean can go in the **RECYCLE** bin – if food residue remains they can go in the **GREEN ORGANICS BIN** (light green lid) and **GO BAGLESS** in the **RECYCLE BIN** – **do not bag your recycling**.

Do you know when which bin is collected?

This information is available on printed calendars that are issued each financial year and available from late June.

Recycling bottles and cans close to home

Did you know that you can recycle 10c deposit cans and bottles in Clayton Bay and assist the CBCA?

You can drop off bottles and cans behind the hall on Alexandrina Drive or drop them into the trailer near the Shelter Shed by the river.

This funds raised are split 50--50 between the Clayton CFS and the CBCA's programs.



Another Carp recipe!



Carp fillet with spicy topping

Thanks to Rohini Dwyer of Condobolin

Preparation Time 25 minutes Cooking Time 15 minutes Serves 8

- 2 tbsp olive oil
 - 8 pieces carp, fillets bones removed, skin on
 - 280g green olives drained seeded and halved
 - 4 cloves garlic sliced
 - ¼ cup baby capers drained
 - ½ cup white wine
 - 1 stalk lemongrass chopped
 - 2 tbsp white wine vinegar
 - 30g butter diced
 - 2 tbsp chopped parsley
1. Rub half the oil into the fish pieces and season well.
 2. Mix together olives, garlic, capers, lemon grass and remaining oil.
 3. Cook fish fillets on a preheated barbecue plate, skin side down for 5-6 mins, turn and cook for a further 3 mins.
 4. Cook olives, garlic, capers and lemongrass on hot plate stirring for 2-3 mins until garlic is golden.
 5. Heat wine and vinegar in a small pan on high until boiling, boil for 5 minutes or until reduced by half. Reduce heat to medium.
 6. Add butter one piece at a time whisking constantly until all butter is incorporated and sauce is glossy.
 7. Remove from heat.
 8. Stir through parsley.
 9. Top fish pieces with olive mixture, spoon sauce over fish pieces to serve.



Clayton Bay Foreshore Masterplan

The Clayton Bay Community Association recently made enquiries to Alexandrina Council about progress on the implementation of the Clayton Bay Foreshore Masterplan.

The Masterplan was created in 2015 in consultation with the community. You can find a pdf version at www.alexandrina.sa.gov.au if you search for 'Clayton Bay Foreshore Plan'.

The plan's objectives 'aim to balance demands for recreation and nature, beauty and function, heritage and progress; creating a foreshore that continues to attract people while protecting and enhancing the natural and cultural landscapes of the area.'

Shen Mann from Alexandrina Council who had been involved in its development, recently gave the following feedback to the CBCA committee.

A number of projects from the masterplan have already been completed including:

- upgrade of The Point
- upgrade of the public toilets at Old Clayton
- installation of an interpretive signage trail
- landscaping to prevent vehicle access to the clifftop areas.

Council undertook public consultation on the possibility of a 4-knot speed limit in Dunns Lagoon and Council has written to the State Government requesting that they impose these speed restrictions.

A number of further projects from the Masterplan are currently being managed by Council including

- the swimming area and oval foreshore (reed clearance, new oval car park and access road etc) as well as sealing of the boat ramp carpark. The Development Approval process for the reed removal has taken longer than

expected and the final steps are being made to obtain EPA approval. Once approval is received, that project will go out to tender. The new oval car park and access road is expected to be constructed in Feb/ March 2019 and sealing of the boat ramp carpark is currently in the design phase with a possible start date in the 2019-20 financial year.

Current timing of other Clayton Bay Masterplan projects in Council's Long Term Financial Plan is as follows:

The Long Term Financial Plan is subject to Annual Budget processes as well as review of Council's overall priorities, particularly by a newly elected chamber and the timings indicated above are therefore subject to change.


