What a dry June it has been but how wonderful to have had such beautiful sunny days. The Trash'n'Treasure, Drawing on Country and Bonfire were all very successful events socially and financially, with many visitors discovering Clayton Bay for the first time.



A lot is happening environmentally around our area. Not too far away, the Point Sturt Landcare Reserve and Watchalunga are both undertaking plantings in July and August while locally our Foreshore area is being weeded and mulched. When I first became a committee member the first paid plantings under the Presidency of Tim Roberts occurred in this area of the walking trail and it's great to see how well established they are now.

The Census results were released recently so now when people ask how many live at Clayton Bay the answer can be confidently given—it's officially 350, of which 50.6% are male and 49.4% are female. The median age is 60, there are 94 families and 379 private dwellings. The information is quite interesting and is a good indicator of how Clayton Bay is growing when compared to the previous census.

It is good to see people rally around those who are experiencing sad and challenging times at the moment—and there seem to be quite a few. Whether it is the loss of a loved one, illness or unexpected health issues, it is reassuring to know that as a community we reach out to our neighbours and offer moral support, help and assistance—one of the great things about living in a small community.

FOR EXERCISE, FOR EXERCISE, FOR EXERCISE

It was Tuesday the 4th of April and the Paddle Steamer Oscar'w had arrived at Clayton after an uneventful trip up the river from Goolwa. The crew were having tea when an explosion occurred in the back end of the engine room. Several crew were evacuated from the vessel and the first officer called for assistance from the CFS.

On arrival several CFS crew ran out hoses to attack the flames on the vessel and the reeds. An agitated Captain was yelling that three crew members were missing – presumed to still be on the boat. The incident Manager ordered the Breathing Apparatus (B.A.) crews to get set up for a search of the vessel. The search parties – 2 at a time had to search individual areas of the boat.

As each team returned they had to report their findings to The Entry Control Officer and team. The rear of the boat – including the presidential suite was completely smoke logged and searching became extremely difficult. Eventually 3 bodies were found and brought ashore. First aid was applied and 2 could be revived but sadly a crew member died at the scene.

Each Breathing Apparatus operator carries a device that emits a high pitched siren if the B.A. Operator does not move for a given period of time. Hence, when the B.A. Operators are all donned up and waiting to go in to the fire – they are seen to be constantly moving. After the final body was found and the search teams were withdrawn, one of these sirens was found to be sounding on the boat. After a quick check of the B.A. teams, it was found that a crew member had not returned from the boat.

The Entry Control Officer organised 4 search teams to re enter the boat to search for the missing B.A. Operator. He was found down the side of the boiler where he had fallen and knocked him-


self out. The rescue teams then had to retrieve and treat one of their own.

A Cadet at the scene became ill and became unconscious and was administered first aid. An Ambulance was called and this cadet and parent were sent to hospital. He remained in hospital overnight and it was found that he is allergic to spider bites. Unfortunately his uniform had been the home of a spider before he put it on.

The above story was a recreation of an incident to develop the skills of CFS volunteers and the Oscar'w crew. The Strathalbyn Group of CFS is made up of 7 brigades and this night there were 8 trucks and 2 command cars in attendance. Also there were 50 - 60 CFS volunteers in attendance and trained very hard in a simulated exercise that was a completely different situation than what we are used to.

The Strathalbyn CFS Group would like to thank the Oscar'w committee and crew for giving permission for the Paddle Steamer and crew to attend and assist us to develop our training skills. Oscar'w returned to Goolwa after our exercise, thus giving a skipper training at commanding the vessel in the channel at night. This evening was a great success and collaboration between the 2 organisations.



The walking trail is looking superb at the moment thanks to the efforts of authorized volunteers. Laurie regularly hoes out the weeds and mulch is being spread to help keep them at bay. If you would like to hear more about what is happening around the trail and elsewhere come along to the AGM in August where Shen Mann will be a guest speaker and talk about the Foreshore Masterplan.

In May The Nature Foundation South Australia held one of their regular board meetings at the Clayton Bay Community Hall. They were keen to get to know the people involved in environmental work, view the local plant nursery operated by the Clayton Bay Nursery and Environmental Group and also discuss the plight of the endangered southern bell frog.

Presentations were given by a number of people including Peter Mirtschin who explained a possible way the southern bell frog could be bred and reintroduced into the lower lakes if a suitable

breeding facility could be found and developed. He also highlighted the plight of tiger snakes around the lakes region.

The Point Sturt Landcare Group has been working hard in maintaining the Point Sturt Landcare Reserve Recently the pathway was upgraded and signage will be placed to identify 39 of the main species at the Reserve. These will be installed by volunteers In July.

The Clayton Bay Nursery and Environment Group have been contracted to weed the reserve funded by the Alexandrina Council as part of a maintenance grant. An additional 250 new plants, mainly chosen for the clay pan area on the Road Reserve, have been purchased and a planting day is planned for August.

If you are interested in becoming involved in this, or future planting/maintenance activities at this reserve, contact Alan King - aking@esc.net.au It's worth a trip to the reserve to see what has been achieved there. It's a great spot for a picnic overlooking Lake Alexandrina.

THE CHEER UP HUT

The **MILANG RED CROSS BRANCH** has a new home on the grounds of the Milang Oval.

We have called the building "The Cheer Up Hut". The name relates back to WWI & WWII where Australian soldiers went for a meal, dance, a sing along and some cheer up, some soldiers would read newspapers or write letters to loved ones or some would rest and relax before heading off to the front again, others would sit quietly and remember the close mates who didn't make it home; all provided by Red Cross Volunteers and the South Australian Cheer- Up Society for free. This was a uniquely South Australian idea and was situated at the Adelaide Railway Station.



At the Milang Red Cross building we have our monthly meetings and volunteers run the Trading Tables and retail side of things on a weekly basis. We sell men's, ladies and children's clothing, shoes, bags, books, toys, linen and bricabrac etc. Tea, coffee and music will be provided free of charge. We opened on Wed 3rd of May 2017.

New Stock arrives every week, so pop in and check us out. Don't forget to lookout for up and coming specials such as clearance tables, half price day and fill a bag for \$5 (conditions apply).

Trading Hours
Wednesdays – 9am-12noon
Saturdays 10am -3pm

Also the Branch has a trading hut at the entrance to the oval in the old ticket box to sell fruit, veg, books and plants etc on a honour system. This is to bring in more revenue towards our building, up keep and running costs. Money can be left in tin or paid at Cheer Up Hut when it's open.

We have a working partnership with Milang Community Garden, volunteers and local farmers regarding this project so both organisations and the community can benefit from this programme.

The whole building has been painted inside and out. A kitchen has been purchased and fitted. A mobile bench and new hot water system was donated. The building electrics and plumbing have been brought up to standards and codes. Security screens and monitoring system installed. Shelving, lockup cupboards and racks have been purchased and roller blinds have been installed. The roof has been fixed and the new guttering was donated and installed. To date the building has had over \$15000.00 worth of renovations and fixtures installed to it which is amazing considering this was either from donations, fundraisers or grants and we have only been at the oval complex for last 10months. All this while still raising over \$7000 for Australian Red Cross programs.

I thought my involvement and contribution would be very small and insignificant. My contribution has been relatively small, but certainly not considered insignificant. Small contributions from all the community are what makes us such







Following on from the Vision Milang! town meeting held on 6th June, Adrian Pederick, MP for Hammond, called for another meeting specifically to discuss our options on the closure of the GP Clinic in Milang. There were well over 50 attendees, from Milang, Strath, Clayton Bay and our local district. The general feeling was of disappointment for the short notice of this decision making options difficult to find for alternative arrangements. Whilst it is acknowledged that there is a Community Car in Milang, this is heavily booked now for medical trips into Adelaide and other regions. The general expectation to use the car seems reasonable, however, the extra pressure on our already hard working volunteers may have been overlooked. Other attendees were Mitchell from Rebekha Sharkie's office and we received a statement and apology from Mayor Keith Parkes.

Adrian encouraged comment and discussion from the floor and offered to contact Minister Jack Snelling to engage further our options. There were several options agreed to follow up.

- 1. To speak to Minister Snelling to alert him to this dilemma, especially given that the federal government is encouraging our older citizens to remain independent at home, and now taking away much needed medical services may see an early admission into higher level residential care
- 2. To investigate further options with regard to funding for a community car
- 3. To request the GP's consider extending this closure date to give us time to put alternative services in place

To investigate further with Country Health to see if they would fund a GP clinic

Adrian advised that he would initiate a meeting with Minister Snelling, and invite MADCA President Mike Linscott and MADCA CEO Fiona Pitcairn to attend with him.



Birds in Our Area



Ducks

It is a different winter this year with the beautiful dry, calm, sunny days.

On a couple of days this week I have noticed quite a large number of ducks swimming in circles and back and forth on the calm water below the cliffs. They looked quite comical with their heads down, beaks just below the surface skimming through the water, obviously feeding on something, for long periods of time.

Most of the group were *Pacific Black Ducks* (black stripes on face), but I also identified a few *Hardheads* (dark brown head), a couple of *Grey Teal* (white cheeks and neck) and one lone *Australasian Shoveler* (massive long dark bill) on the edge of the group.

The majority of the duck species in Australia are dabblers and "they feed by 'suzzling' and upending for animal and plant food, drawing in a stream of mud and water through the open tip of the bill and discharging it through combs in sides of the upper mandible, retaining small food items." (Pizzey and Knight)

Other ducks that I have spotted now and then in this area over the years are *Musk Duck* (male has large flap hanging under bill), *Blue-billed Duck* (black head, blue bill), *Australian Shelduck* (dark head, chestnut breast) and *Chestnut Teal* (dark green head, chestnut breast).

Native Vegetation is Good for Us

When our pioneers first came to Australia, the values of Europe and England were applied to our land to replicate the food crops and gardens of the lands from where they came. We now know those principles could have been modified significantly to live with the land rather than fight it. Australia has some of the most beautiful and locally adapted plants ready made for our gardens, parks and bushland. Millions of years of evolution have produced plants that can survive our harsh cycle of droughts and floods without any help at all from us.

Growing native plants is so sensible. These are the best plants to attract our native wildlife. Our birds, mammals and reptiles have evolved along with the plants to utilise the native Australian plants best. It's also sensible for a number of other reasons. Less care and attention is required and very importantly, little or no watering is necessary. One of the most important reasons supporting native plants is however is that it is so good for our health.

Recent research has shown that a 90-min walk in a natural setting, decreases depressive thoughts about oneself, whereas a 90-min walk in an urban setting has no such effects. The research suggested that a nature experiences may improve mental well-being therefore such areas may be a critical resource for good mental health in our rapidly urbanizing world. If we take a wander along the river walking trail from the wharf around past the point then on past Dunn's lagoon, you quickly realise we have such a wonderful resource in Clayton Bay. A healing track!

We are so lucky we have people here in our small town who have given many hours of their time to restore the native plants along this track. You'll see different birds and animals every time you take the walk. Congratulations and thanks for the foresight of the Alexandrina Council, Clayton Bay Nursery and Environment Group, the Clayton Bay Community Association and the many volunteers over the years who contributed.

What a fabulous evening! Perfect weather yet again. During the week the sand for the base was delivered (thanks Goolwa Quarries who donated the sand and it's delivery, and to Nick J for organizing this) and spread thanks to Leigh on his trusty bobcat. Wood which had been stored at the Goolwa Waste Recycling Depot during the year (thanks Darren) was delivered (thanks to **CBNEG** for a donation to help with this cost) amidst oohs and ahhs at the size of some of the logs! Then the fun really began. The building of the structure under the guidance of Brian and Laurie, and assisted by 20 helpers, commenced with sorting, cutting, placing and securing the pallets (donated by Max Dix and Project Wines). A tractor was provided by Bruce (Milang) and transported to Clayton by Neil (CB Towing) and was useful in the placement of the logs.

Meanwhile Pene was immersed in preparing the base for the ever popular mulled wine. The fumes in the hall's kitchen were enough to raise blood alcohol levels! WAR ON WASTE

Thanks to an investment of \$50,000 from Zero Waste SA a new soft plastics recycling scheme is in place at many Coles stores. The scheme accepts a range of soft plastics for recycling. You can drop off materials including the reusable 'green bags', freezer bags, plastic packaging and newspaper and magazine wraps. Many other supermarkets are also recycle soft plastics too, check with your local store.

Many of us have been tricked into using the triangular symbol with a number inside to identify what can be recycled. But this symbol is NOT a recycling symbol. It is a plastics identification code used to tell manufacturers what type of plastic the item is made from.

Plastic bags used in packaging often show the plastics identification symbol with a number 4 but all soft plastics, including plastic bags, create problems at the MRF by wrapping around machinery.

Do not place **soft plastics** in the recycling bin. Plastic bags can be recycled through specially labelled bins at your local supermarket.

Likewise **irrigation and garden hoses** can wrap around machinery in the MRF so need to be placed in the waste bin.

Lightweight polystyrene, such as used for meat trays, packaging (including foam packing 'peanuts') and hot drink cups are often labelled with a number 6 but as this plastic has been 'expanded' from a rigid form to foam it cannot be put in kerbside recycle bins. Place polystyrene foam in your waste bin.

COMMUNITY CONSULTATION



Have your say on camping on Council land and mooring at Council jetties by 26 July,2017.

Outside of designated caravan parks, Council currently has had no areas of local gov-

ernment land where camping is lawfully permitted. There are also currently no restrictions in relation to mooring at jetties or pontoons attached to Council land. These are areas of frequent concern raised by community to Council and the following proposals seek to find a balance between the reasonable use of local government land by our community and concerns associated with the current inability to regulate or enforce restrictions.

Council is seeking feedback on a proposal to allow camping for a maximum 72 hour period at Frank Potts Reserve in Langhorne Creek.

It is also proposed to define three key zoned areas of mooring throughout the Council area (Goolwa, Clayton Bay and Milang) and that mooring within each zone be limited to a maximum of 24 hours, with a non-return period of 72 hours. This would ensure that vessels moored within the district could not remain permanently

moored without at least a short period outside of the district or utilising alternative mooring facilities.

The proposal seeks to find a suitable balance between the reasonable use of public mooring and support for local businesses who provide commercial mooring facilities for vessels staying for longer periods of time.



Through a previous resolution of Council, dogs are currently required to be onleash between 10am and 6pm when being exercised on any reserve or coastal foreshore area

across the district. (The list of areas this applies to is on

the web site.) On Council reserves and beaches, the current 10am - 6pm on-leash requirements apply.

Feedback is also sought on the introduction of changes to standard dog on-leash time during daylight savings (8am - 8pm) for reserves and foreshore areas which are not identified in the table above (which would include Clayton Bay).
